NURSES' ORDER OF WARD WORK,

DIETARY FOR INFANTS.—

One month old.—1 part milk, 1 part hot water, 1 part lime water. Vary quantity of lime water according to state of child's bowels. Feed every two hours, giving from ʒij to ʒiij.

Two months old.—2 parts milk, 1 part or 1½ hot water, 1 part or ½ lime water. Feed every three hours, giving from ʒiij to ʒvi.

Three months old.—2 parts milk, 1 part hot water, 1 teaspoonful lime water. Feed, increasing quantity to ʒvij, every three or four hours. The bottles should be sweetened and given at a temperature of 96 degrees or 98 degrees. Barley Water, or Oatmeal Water, with the fibre of the meal left in, may be used alternately with, or instead of the Lime Water.

After six months.—The milk should be given as little diluted as possible, but still with some lime water.

After eight months.—The frequency of the bottles should be decreased, and some more solid food given with spoon, such as rusk softened in boiling water, and mixed with warm milk; porridge, arrowroot.

After ten months.—Feed entirely with spoon and give beef tea; chicken broth once a day. If the child is sick, some food may be mixed with the milk as early as the fifth month, and even beef tea may be given if cow's milk seems to disagree. Arrowroot or gruel can be easily given in the feeding bottle.

After sixteen or eighteen months.—Very finely minced meat or chicken mixed with bread crumbs and gravy, with custard pudding, bread and milk, porridge, etc., may form the diet, not feeding the child oftener than every three or four hours, and never between its meals.

DIET-SLIP AND SLATE.—Diet-slip and slate to be written by the Ward Sister.

DISINFECTANT BASINS.—Disinfectant basins to be changed at 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. by Ward Probationer or No. 3 Probationer, carbolic acid to be used 1 in 20 lotion. All utensils used for infectious cases, to be marked with Patient's name, this to be done by Probationer of each Ward or as otherwise arranged by Ward Sister.

DISPENSARY.—Nurses are not to go to the Dispensary for medicine, except that on emergency the Staff Nurse may be sent by the Ward Sister.

DISPENSARY BASKET AND MEDICINE CUPBOARD.—Dispensary Basket and Medicine Cup-

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
