F,R.C.S., Birmingham.—The glass bowls with coloured rims are made by Messrs, Maw, Son, and Thompson, of 7, Aldersgate Street, London, E.C. We designed them for exhibition at the Chicago Exhibition in 1893, and we learn they are now used in Germany, as well as in the States and England. Rims can be made in blue, red, green, or, indeed, in any colour, and a colour is accredited to each disinfectant or dressing, and used only in connection with it. Thus, in the theatre and ward, mistakes are avoided. We believe the thermometer glasses we designed can also be got at Maw's, but we are not sure. They are cylindrical in shape, made in colour, to hold disinfectant, with a lid, in which six or more holes are pierced, so that the ball of the instrument rests in the fluid. White jars are inscribed "mouth," red, "rectum," blue, "axilla." Nothing can be more distasteful to a patient than that the same thermometer should be used in various parts of the body indiscriminately, even if it is carefully washed. Mrs. S.
