Next day he announces, publicly, that his honour is satisfied, and goes away not to return. Years after, when he is thought dead, he and Egidio meet in New York. Now, what did the husband hear in that confession? The priest has no doubt of the wife's innocence; but if she were innocent why did her husband not let her know that he lived? We are left in all the heart-searching doubt called up by the question.


