MISS ELÉNE TRAIFOROS.

We have pleasure in presenting to our readers a portrait of Miss Eléne Traiforos, a Member of the Matrons' Council of Great Britain and Ireland, Miss Traiforos, who is one of four sisters who have entered the nursing Profession, is partially of Greek as well as of British extraction. She

was trained for three years, and certificated at the Victoria Hospital, Burnley, and on the completion of her training in 1892 was appointed Night Sister at the Royal Infirmary, Aberdeen, where she subsequently held the positions of Ward Sister and Assistant Superintendent. In 1895 she became Matron of the Memorial Hospital, Mirfield, a post which she held until January of the present year. She was appointed to her present position of Matron of the Macclesfield Infirmary in May last.

Miss Traiforos takes a deep in-terest in all that concerns the better organisation, and the general welfare of the nursing profession, and is a keen supporter of the principle of

State Registration for nurses.

MISS ARMSTRONG DIXON.

Miss K. E. Armstrong Dixon was trained and certificated at King's College Hospital. She subsequently was appointed Ward Sister at the Lewisham Infirmary, where she also held the positions of Night Superintendent and Assistant Matron. In 1898 she was appointed Matron of the Greenwich Union Infirmary, an institution having over 500 beds. She still holds this position.

MISS BEATRICE CUTLER.

Miss Beatrice Cutler was trained and certificated at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London. In 1890 she was appointed Sister at the Kaisr-el-Aini Hospital, Cairo, a position which she held until January 1892, when she was transferred from the Sanitary Service to that of Public Instruction, and became Sub-Directrice of the Kaisr-el-Aini, an appointment to which was attached the superintendence of the Girls'

Medical School. She also had charge of the midwifery wards of the hospital, and worked up the gynaecological section. JANE C. CHILD. Miss J. C. Child was trained at St. Thomas' Hospital, after which she held the positions of Sister at the Sussex County Hospital, and of Matron of the Victoria Hospital,

In 1895 she joined the Registered Lewes. Nurses' Society, of which she remained a member until 1899. Miss Child was one of the English Sisters selected for service in the Græco-Turkish war, and received the Greek Red Cross, awarded by the Queen of the Hellenes for excellent service in nursing the sick and wounded. In 1899 she was appointed Sister at Kimberley Hospital, where she arrived at the outbreak of the war, and went through the siege. Early in the present year she was appointed Matron of the Memorial Hospital, Bulawayo, Rhodesia.
