The Prince at Bart's.

With ceremonies that have been handed down for half-a-dozen centuries, the Prince of Wales received his charge on Tuesday last as President of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, in the Great Hall of the Hospital, where a Special General Court of Governors had assembled, as well as the medical and surgical staff, the Matron Miss Isla Stewart, and the Sisters of the Hospital.

The Treasurer, Sir Trevor Lawrence, gave a short address, in which he described the antiquity of the hospital, and said that the institution enabled the poorest in the land to reap the advantage of the highest professional skill and the most perfect nursing.

The Prince said he was proud to become associated with an institution whose history dated back to the Twelfth Century. He looked upon it as a great compliment to succeed his father, who held the position for thirty-four years, and took the keenest interest in the welfare of the Hospital, which his Majesty charged him to say would be maintained.

It is interesting to note that fifty-five years ago, when the Prince Consort was elected to a Governorship of the hospital, the event was commemorated by the presentation to the foundation by the president and treasurer of three magnificent silver-gilt dishes, the subjects in bold relief being the election of Prince Albert, the Good Samaritan, and the Plague.

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
