A Census of Persons Engaged in Aursing and Institution Service.

Unlike the method adopted at previous Censuses, when the Occupations of the people of England and Wales were published in one Volume, and at a late period after the taking of the Census, the authorities have created a new departure this time by publishing the results of the Census, taken just a year ago, in County sections. The first occupational results to appear are those relating to the Administrative County of London, which comprises the City of London, together with the twenty-eight Metropolitan Boroughs constituted under the London Government Act of 1899. The figures given showing the number of persons engaged in Hospital and Institution Service on the night of March the 31st of last year, are as follows:—

Total—Males, 1,965.
Total—Females, 4,619—3,907 unmarried and 712 married or widowed.

Comparing these totals—1,965 and 4,619—with the numbers enumerated at the previous Census in 1891 with the same area—1,607 and 3,366—we find the increases during the decade to have amounted to 358 and 1,253 respectively. The totals at the recent Census are distributed under the following range of ages:—

The Plumbers' Registration Bill.

The Bill has been put down for Monday, April 28th, but its prospects are not those which its supporters could desire.

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
