Pleasant Preparations.

FROM A BOARD ROOM MIRROR.



His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has appointed Mr. Reginald Lund (who for the last six years has acted as secretary to the Special Appeal Committee of Charing Cross Hospital) organising secretary to the League of Mercy. Mr. Lund, who is as courteous as he is energetic, will doubtless do much to make the League popular and financially successful.

Among those who were presented with prizes by the Lord Mayor at Guy's Hospital Medical School was Mr. Carrick Hey Robertson, a great-great-grandnephew of Thomas Guy, the founder of the hospital.

According to the annual report of the inspectors, which was issued recently, there was a total increase of 461 lunatics in Ireland during the year, the corresponding increase for the previous year having been 306.

A large attendance is expected at the international conference for the prevention of consumption, to be held in Berlin from October 22nd to October 26th. The question of the identity of bovine and human tuberculosis will be one of the chief topics of debate.

Major Ross, F.R.S., of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, who recently arrived at Ismailia to report on the cause of malaria there, states that it is due to the anopheles mosquitoes, which are found in many of the houses, and which breed in two small marshes close to the town. Measures to free the place from this and other kinds of mosquitoes have been promptly commenced by the officials of the Suez Canal Company. Sir William MacGregor, K.C.M.G., Governor of Lagos, who is much interested in the subject on account of his own territory, has accompanied Major Ross in order to watch the operations.

Among the passengers who left last week by the African steamer Burutu was Dr. Logan Taylor, who goes out to the Gold Coast, on the tenth expedition formed by the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. Recent reports show the present condition of the Gold Coast is very unhealthy, malaria and other tropical diseases being prevalent, and Dr. Logan Taylor will direct practical operations against the insanitary condition of the principal towns.

Dr. Loir, who organised the Tunis branch of the Pasteur Institute, is starting for Bulawayo on a like errand. He says that early in this month a telegram was received from Dr. Jameson asking that someone might be sent from the institute as soon as possible, as cases of rabies were numerous. Dr. Loir was accordingly invited to proceed to Bulawayo for the purpose of founding an establishment for the treatment of rabies, and he at once accepted the offer.

The Committee of Management of the Melbourne Hospital have decided to call for plans throughout the world for a new hospital, to cost £150,000. The present building is regarded as out of date, and too small.
