intimidated and silenced by the opposition they en-countered? By no means. "Then Paul and Barnacountered? By no means. "Then Paul and Barna-bas waxed bold, and said, 'It was necessary that the word of God should first have been spoken to you ; but seeing ye put it from you, and judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life, lo, we turn to the Gen-

tiles.'' It was well and bravely spoken, and, in my view, it is a policy worthy of imitation. Those who know much about the registration movement know that of the large numbers of nurses who approve of the principle of registration only a limited few realise their professional responsibility sufficiently to be willing to make personal sacrifices for the Cause. The greater number, intimidated by the contradiction they encounter, put the question from them till a more convenient season. Are those who are convinced of the duty they owe

to the sick to sit down and wait for the less cour-ageous? Surely not. "Lo, we turn to the Gentiles" is a sound principle. And as the mission of St. Paul grew from a national to a worldwide movement by itsad option, so the registration movement will overflow narrow professional boundaries until, backed by Now narrow professional boundaries until, backed by overwhelming public opinion, the Bill for the State Registration of Trained Nurses, in spite of all the opposition which will be brought to bear against it, becomes law on the mandate of the people. Calculation will easily prove that the beds available for the instruction of pupils in this branch, in lying-in hospitals and in the wards of workhouse infirmaries com-bined, do not provide a training ground for the number of candidates who enter for the examination of the London Obstetrical Society each quarter. We are of opinion that the first part of the training given should always beimparted in the wards of an institution receiving in-patients.
