# International Mews.

Miss M'Gahey intends to take a rest and thoroughly re-establish her health after her twelve years' arduous and splendid work for nursing in Sydney, before undertaking lighter professional work in Australia. The meetingplace in Berlin, and the exact date will not be notified on the agenda, as these minor details will be arranged by Miss L. L. Dock, the hon. secretary, when she arrives in Germany in the spring. The meeting will be held in the week of June beginning Monday, 13th prox., and we are pleased to hear that it is probable that it will be very widely attended.

Miss Dock is a keen disciple of internationalism, and her wonderfully facile brain has sprung the question that, as there are now four Matrons' Councils —in the United States and Canada combined, Great Britain and Ireland, Holland, and New South Wales, "Why would it not be a good idea for these Councils to affiiliate next summer in Berlin ? They might help to cheer one another along the thorny path of duty."

This happy thought was first expressed by Miss Dock last summer, after a most happy gathering around the hospitable board of Miss Kruysse at the Wilhelmina Hospital at Amsterdam.
