## The Matrons' Council.

The Quarterly Meeting of the Matrons' Council of Great. Britain and Ireland took place at 431, Oxford Street, on Friday, May 13th, at 11 a.m. Miss Isla Stewart, (President) presided, and there was a good attendance, of members.

The minutes of the last meeting having been read and confirmed, the President called on the Hon. Secretary to read the following

REPORT. Since the last meeting of the Matrons' Council Miss

the Matrons' Council Miss Rogers, of Leicester Infirmary, has accepted the posi-tion of Vice-President of the Council. On the invi-tation of Miss Isla Stewart, Hon. Vice-President of the International Council of Nurses, a Conference of Representatives of Nurses' Leagues and self-govern-ing Nursing Societies was convened to consider the question of "Organisation with a view to International Affiliation," and met in London on April 8th. Each society was invited to send six delegates. Those who attended on behalf of the Matrons' Council were : The President (Miss Isla Stewart), who presided, Miss President (Miss Isla Stewart), who presided, Miss Marquardt (Matron Camberwell Infirmary), Miss Cameron (Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, City Road), Miss Morgan (Matron Northern Hospi-tal, Winchmore Hill), and the Hon. Secretary. After full discussion the meeting unanimously passed the a full discussion the meeting unanimously passed the following resolutions :--

Resolution 1.-That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable, for the promotion of unity and mutual understanding between associations of trained nurses,

that National Councils of Nurses be formed. Resolution 2.—That in furtherance of this object those present at this Conference recommend that a Provisional Committee be formed of delegates from societies of nurses represented at this meeting, with a view to affiliation with the International Council of Nurses.

Resolution 3.—That this Provisional Committee shall act as the intermediary for this country with the International Council of Nurses, until it represents by delegation 5,000 trained nurses, when a Constitution forming a National Council of Nurses of England shall be considered:

The delegates present were asked to invite their respective Leagues present were asked to invite their te spective Leagues to nominate six delegates as soon as possible, so, that the Committee might be formed before the meeting of the International Council of Nurses in Berlin in June. If possible it was con-sidered desirable that some of those nominated should be ladies who would be present at the meeting in Berlin.

A letter has been received from the National Union of Women Workers in relation to the question of the discontinuance of the custom of passing resolutions on general subjects at the meetings of the National Council. The point was brought forward at the last annual meeting of the Union, and was referred back
