The arrangements for the Conference of the National Union of Women Workers at Birmingham, which is to be held in the New Central Hall, Corporation Street, from October 23rd to October 27th, are now complete.

The programme is as under: On Monday, October 23rd, will be held the Rescue Workers' meeting, at which Miss Clifford, the President of the Union, will pre-side and open the discussion, when a paper on "The Common Lodging House" will be read. A meeting of Branch Secretaries will also be held to discuss "How to Interest Young Workers in the Branches" and "The Work of the Sectional Committees in relation to the Branches and Affiliated Societies"

"The Work of the Sectional Committees in relation to the Branches and Affiliated Societies." On Tuesday, October 24th, papers will be read—in the morning on "Vacation Schools" and on "Play Centres." The afternoon will be given up to the meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, and the reception of the Reports of Sectional Council and the reception of the Reports of Sectional Committees and Branches, all too short a time for this important work. In the evening the Moral, Legal, and Economic aspects of Parental Re-sponsibility will be discussed. On Wednesday, Octo-ber 25th, the morning session will be devoted to a meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain and Ireland, when the officers for the ensuing year will be elected, and Resolutions considered. The Lady Mayoress, Mrs. C. G. Beale, will preside in the afternoon; when the subject will be "Children," "The present treatment of Criminal Children," "Children's Courts of Justice," "The Probation. System" and "The George Justice,"

"Children's Courts of Justice," "The Probation. System," and "The George Junior Republic." On Thursday, October 26th, the subject in the morning will be "Emigration." (a) of Families, (b) of Elder Girls for Service, (c) of Children to Canada. In the afternoon there will be a Girls' Meeting, the subjects for discussion being "The Employment of Leisure" and "Comradeship," and also in another Hall a discussion on "The Destitute, and Various Ways of Helping Then.," the papers in this section being "The Colony System" and "Free Food for Children." In the evening of the same day the subject for dis-cussion is "The Teaching of the Simpler Rules of Health and Temperance in Elementary and Secondary Schools," after which the Congress will close.
