It is almost impossible to overpraise the picture given us of Soames Forsyte. But the effect of it upon many readers will probably be what the writer himself did not intend. Soames is intended to be an unsympathetic person. But through the whole gathering bitterness of his tragedy, it is difficult to resist the feeling that, with so many good points, Soames might have been made a good fellow by a woman who could have loved him, and made him the father of little children.

There is a finish, a balance, a symmetery about the whole thing which is truly admirable—a force, a restrain which prevent the cynicism from degenerating into sneers. We are reminded throughout of "The Voysey Inheritance," but it is a resemblance of two equals, not the resemblance of an original and

its imitator.
