The following statement has been received by the legal adviser of Miss Hulme,

the late Superintendent of the Nurses' Hostel, Francis Street, W.C., from the solicitor to its Board of Directors, and we have been requested to publish it:—

to publish it:—

"We have received the Board's authority to write and say that in superseding your client, Miss Hulme, as Superintendent of the Hostel, they did not intend to cast the slightest slur on her character, integrity, or professional ability and that their action was due to their opinion that Miss Hulme's views of the object of such an institution as a Hostel differed from their own."

We congratulate Miss Hulme on this somewhat tardy apology and it is interesting to note that the majority of the reforms asked for by the nurses at the Hostel during Miss Hulme's term of residence have now been granted—the last most useful one being that the telephone will be available during the night as well as during the day.

Miss Hulme has taken three houses in Colosseum Terrace, Regent's Park, in a very central position, which are to be opened about the middle of December as a Nurses' Lodge. Terms are to be moderate, home comfort considered in every detail, the telephone on night and day, and two trained ladies are co-operating with Miss Hulme in the management. There is no doubt ample scope for such an institution near the west-cnd medical district, several Homes we know of are always over-crowded, and we know of many nurses living in rooms, who would greatly prefer to reside in a really well-managed house, where the home atmos-

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
