In view of the approach of the time when the constitution of the National Council of Nurses will have to be considered in this country, the position which the Matrons' Council should take in such a Council was then considered and discussed at some length. Eventually on the proposition of Miss Mollett, seconded by Miss Pearse, a sub-committee was appointed to consider the question and to lay a scheme before the next meeting of the Council.

RESOLUTION.

The following resolution, proposed by Miss Sidney Browne, and seconded by Miss Villiers, was then considered and carried unanimously : "That the Matrons' Council of Great Britain

"That the Matrons' Council of Great Britain and Ireland supports the Petition to be presented to the Prime Minister on behalf of the Society for the State Registration of Trained Nurses, urging that a Government Bill for the State Registration of Nurses should be introduced next Session, and emphasises the importance of the provision of public safeguards in connection with those who undertake the care of the sick as professional nurses."

The meeting then terminated.
