Speaking at the Royal United Service Institution of the rôle of the Red Cross Societies in Peace and War, Lieutenant-Colonel W. G. Macpherson, R.A.M.C., declared the official organisation for the care of sick and wounded by the Japanese in the late war, which he had seen at work, to be a magnificent and efficient machine.

He pointed out that in Japan groups of relief or nursing sections were formed, each consisting of two doctors, an accountant, one apothecary, two superintendent nurses, and twenty nurses. These groups can each take over a hundred patients. At the beginning of the war with Russia there were 116 groups ready, 98 being female nursing sections, by the end of it 150. In their organisation it seemed to the lecturer that the Japanese had solved the problem of women's work in war, and in Japan one in every forty-five of the whole population was a member of the Red Cross Society.

In this country we had excellent material and splendid peace organisations which could easily be adapted for work in connection with our military medical organisation—the St. John Ambulance Association, the St. John Ambulance Brigade, the Army Nursing Reserve, the Soldiers and Sailors' Help Society, the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association, and the British Red Cross Society. These bodies, however, required co-ordination and consolidation of their work, and there were many models available. Above all, the methods by which the Red Cross Societies were kept in touch with the responsible military authorities in time of peace should be carefully studied.
