## The Provisional Committee of the Mational Council of Murses of Great Britain and Ireland.

A meeting of the above Committee was held at 431, Oxford Street, W., on Thursday, March 28th. Miss Isla Stewart, Hon. Vice-President

LETTER FROM THE HON. SECRETARY, INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF NURSES.

The following letter from Miss L. L. Dock, Hon. Secretary of the International Council of Nurses, was next read and considered.

The Provisional Committee of the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain and Ireland.

Madam Chairman and Members of the Committee, You will all have seen, in our official organ, the British Journal of Nursing, the notices which

have appeared from time to time relative to the coming interim Conference of the International Council of Nurses in Paris, on the 18th, 19th, and 20th of next June. The officers of the Council all join in extending to the individual members of the affiliating bodies of nurses the most cordial invitation and warm welcome to the Conference, and we shall be most grateful if your Committee will communicate this letter to the Hon. Secretaries of the affiliating Societies, asking them to publish it in their official organs, and to interest the members of such Societies in the Conference. As it is an interim meeting, not designed for regular business, nor competent to take official action on points reserved by our Constitution for the quinquennial meetings, it will, perhaps, be even more interesting to the members in general, as its main purpose will be the promotion of international acquaintanceship and friendliness, with informal and free discussion of all those lines of nursing work and endeavour which are of special interest to us all. As Paris is central, it seems probable that we shall have a truly international gathering there, and the prospects of a truly stimulating exchange of experience and progress in nursing work are such that no one can fail to be impressed with the truth that our problems, difficulties, endeavours, and aims are the same in all countries.

Beside the regular members of our affiliating bodies, we are hoping to see at our meetings many, who, while not yet in any international or even national association, are in sympathy with our movement toward organisation, and are likewise taking part in educational and economic reform movements.

We believe that this Conference is going to be a rare opportunity for nurses to come into touch with leaders of nursing progress in a number of countries, and we hope to see a large group of the British members, who are now engaged in such an important and significant campaign for education and legal status. Again assuring you of the cordial welcome you will meet with from all the International officers and members,
