Nail Biting.

At a recent meeting of the The Treatment of Paris Academy of Medicine, M. Didsbury, as reported in the Lancet, said that the


treatment of nail biting was a source of Instead of protecting difficulty. the nail. as has hitherto been the practice, he thought that it was better to prevent complete closing of the teeth (desarmer la dent en relevant l'articulation). He showed an appliance which served this purpose; it fitted the lower molars, and was fastened behind the front teeth. Other methods consisted in the use of a gold cap fixed to one molar tooth, a false tooth purposely made too long, or an apparatus removable at meal times which seemed to be the best of all.

The Equipoise Mattress.

The Equipoise wire mattress will change position by volition, on the Equipoise system. It may be placed

on any bedstead of the ordinary type, like the usual wire mattress, and can be used in the horizontal position in the ordinary way, but when the user requires to change his position either for meals, reading, etc., all that is required is that a catch be lifted by either user or attendant, and the patient bends his body, and, without the least effort gains the desired pose. This change of position at will constitutes rest, and has never before been attained without a great deal of effort on the part of the user or the attendant, in adjusting various mechanisms.

This mattress works automatically. As the head and back part rises the seat falls, but the knees



remain in the original position. This inclination of the thighs prevents slipping forward (as in other beds when a head rest or pillows are used), and gives increased comfort and support to the body. The lower leg part may be set to remain level or to rise and fall in unison with the back. Nothing can be more comfortable than when used in this way, as every pose is a natural one. The frame is of angle steel, locking clutch, brass bearings, brass domed nuts, and polished wood base. It folds flat for transit.

The cost of this wonderfully useful article is only four guineas in the 3ft. size and 6 guineas in the 4ft. 6in. size.
