WORK OF THE STATE REGISTRATION COMMITTEE.

Although Scottish nurses at present have no National Association the Scottish State Registration Committee, of which Miss E. S. Haldane is Chairman, and Miss K. L. Burleigh, Lady Superintendent of the Royal Edinburgh Hospital for Sick Children, Hon. Secretary, keeps a watchful eye upon professional interests.

At a recent meeting of the Committee, a resolution was passed in support of the Metropolitan Asylums Board Matrons, which has been widely signed and forwarded to the President of the Local Government Board. Miss Gill, Lady Superintendent of the Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh, has joined the Committee, greatly to the satisfaction of her colleagues.
