Mursing Echoes.

Quite an important innovation took place at "Bart's" last week. The splendid new kitchen, from which are supplied the diets of the patients, as well as the resident staff, has been added to the Matron's department, the male cooks and boys superseded by a highly qualified lady cook in charge, and a female staff under her direction. This system has for years proved most satisfactory at several large hospitals, notably at the Glasgow Royal Infirmary, and will no doubt be found when in working order both economical and desirable at St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

At Guy's Hospital, on the other hand, women cooks were dispensed with some time ago, and a French chef appointed instead, at a salary of £120 a year. The authorities are thoroughly well satisfied with the result. They claim that great economies have been effected, and that the staff is fed in a most appetising manner for 6s. a head per week.

After our visit to the Tondu Hospital at Bordeaux in the spring of last year, we drew attention to the magic of Madame Econome, as a factor in hospital management, and have still agreeable memories of her economical and delicious plats.

Pending the success of Lady Ludlow's fund for building a suitable Nurses' Home at Bart's. the fine class rooms in the still standing block of Christ's Hospital, now the property of the hospital, have been adapted for the nurses' use. Magnificent dining rooms, both for the nurses and wardmaids, painted pale green, provide ample room for all, and in the halls adapted as sitting rooms, the nurses for the first time for many years will have ample space for recreation and study. The whole arrangement is temporary, of course, and a stepping stone to a real comfortable and suitable habitation for the nursing staff, far, far too long delayed.

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
