It is interesting to learn that Miss Gertrude Procopé, who is a native of Helsingfors, Finland, has been appointed by M. Mesureur, Director-General of the Assistance Publique at Paris, to teach massage to the pupils of the Training School for Nurses, connected with the Salpêtrière Hospital. In connection with this subject Miss Procopé will give a course of twenty lectures.

The selection of the Director-General is a very happy one, as Miss Procopé is not only a first-class teacher, but is very popular with her pupils, an important factor in gaining good results. Her practical qualifications are excellent.
