Kaisr-el-Aini Hospital, Cairo, the Native Government Hospital, but first had to register, as a system of State Registration of Nurses is in force in Egypt. She held this position until 1892, when she was appointed Superintendent of the Medical School for Girls in Cairo, and later was appointed Matron of the Victoria Nursing Home in the same city. An interesting and important piece of work to which Miss Cutler was appointed was in connection with the Quarantine Camp at El-Tor. She was the first English nurse appointed to this position, and organised the disinfection and inspection

threshold waiting for her reappearance.

Miss Cutler left Much Wenlock to return to St. Bartholomew's Hospital as Home Sister, and last year was appointed Assistant Matron, a position for which she is well qualified by her administrative gifts.
