Two cases of injury resulting from burns have been reported during the past week. In one case the patient was under treatment for a burn for six weeks subsequently. The other unhappily terminated fatally, the patient dying at a nursing home in London, to which she was removed. In this case the patient, who was scalded when taking a needle bath at Mr. Eugene Sandow's Institute of Physical Culture, was unable to open the doors of the bath, which only opened inwards. In neither case were trained nurses in attendance, but nevertheless nurses whose duty it frequently is to supervise the baths of patients, will do well to lay to heart the necessity for exercising the closest vigilance.

The Scottish Council of Queen Victoria's Jubilee Institute has issued an appeal to which it is hoped a generous response will be made in Scotland. The work done at the headquarters of the Scottish branch in Edinburgh is a national work, and cannot be expanded as the nation requires without increased national support. The affiliated homes in Glasgow, Dundee, Aberdeen, and Paisley train the Queen's Nurses required for those towns, but the nurses for *the whole of the rest of Scotland* are trained in the Central Home in Edinburgh.

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
