The work of district nurses is constantly increasing and, as that of the nursing staff at Carnforth Lodge, Hammersmith, now includes the care of the minor ailments of school children I availed myself of the kind permission of Miss Crowther, who is acting as Superintendent during the interregnum between the departure of Miss Curtis—whose quarter of a century of work has been so fraught with good for the sick poor of Hammersmith and Fulham—and that the residents in the almshouses at Brook Green contributed 2d. each.

Miss Eyres, who for so long has lived with Miss Curtis, was also presented with an *en tous cas* and a carriage clock, gifts which took her completely by surprise. The presentation was made by Dr. Menzies.

Miss Curtis, in a most happy speech, in thanking the subscribers said that the Association owed its foundation to three members of the Charity Organization Society. It began with the establishment of two nurses in lodgings in Agate Road, then a house was taken in the Grove, and later the nursing staff moved to their present quarters at Carnforth Lodge.
