QUEEN ALEXANDRA'S IMPERIAL MILITARY NURSING SERVICE.

PAY AND RETIRED PAY FOR MATRON-IN-CHIEF AND PRINCIPAL MATRONS.

An Army Order states that the minimum rate of pay of a matron-in-chief of the Q.A.I.M.N.S. will be £425, rising by increments of £15 to £470, while the pay of a principal matron will be £260, rising by increments of £12 to £296. These rates will have effect from April 1 last. Retired pay will be assessed to the scale of £2 for each vector of services with the on the scale of £3 for each year of service, with the addition of a rank element as follows: Matron-in-chief, after one year as such, £170, with £40 for each further year up to a maximum of £290; principal matron, after one year as such, £100, rising by £12 a year to £148. The maximum rate of retired pay in both service element and rank element will be £370 for matron-in-chief and £220 for principal matron. It is also provided that board and washing allowance for members of the Q.A.I.M.N.S. and the permanent nursing establishment of military families' hospitals will be 3s. 6d. a day at home and abroad. When free messing or hospital diets and extras are provided the board and washing allowance is reduced to 7d. a day.

A TRUE KNIGHT OF GRACE.

Amongst the promotions in and appointments to the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England recently sanctioned by the King, we note that of Mr. D. H. Illingworth as a Knight of Grace. Mr. Illingworth during the war held the onerous and important position of Director-General of the British Branch of the Croix Rouge Francaise, o, Knightsbridge, S.W., which did such beneficient work in France; and, during the latter years, was responsible for maintaining the French Flag Nursing Corps, a Corps of three years' certificated British Nurses, which worked under the French War Office in hospitals in the war zone and at the base.

The War Office announce the award of a number of Decorations and Medals by the Allied Powers at various dates to the British Forces for distinguished services rendered in the course of the campaign.
