SECTION FOR STUDENT NURSES.

The Council have under consideration the proposal to form a Section for nurses in training and thus to give them opportunity to organise themselves professionally under the Royal Charter. Their names will not, of course, be added to the Membership Roll of the Corporation until their training is completed, but they will be able to participate in many of our activities, and through such participation will be the better qualified to take their share in professional organisation later. There are indications of an increased tendency on the part of Hospital authorities to require that the nurses, training in their Hospitals, shall belong to some organisation, either professional or otherwise. By forming a branch such as that proposed we are offering to the nurses opportunity to join a professional organisation instead of one which might be wholly or partially composed of non-professional workers.
