The Secretary and her Staff desire to offer to the Members of the Royal British Nurses' Association their very warm and sincere thanks for all the messages of goodwill received during the Christmas season; these have given very great pleasure indeed.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS.

We remind our Members that, under the provisions of Bye-law VIII, all Annual Subscriptions to the Association fall due on January 1st in each year. Very many of them have been received, but a considerable number still remain to be sent up; delay in connection with this adds very greatly to the expenses of the office and to the amount of work falling to the clerical staff.

This year we wish specially to draw the attention of the Members to the Helena Benevolent Fund. The income of the Trained Nurses' Annuity Fund is reserved to grant annuities to nurses, while the Settlement Fund provides a Home for retired Nurses; both of these Funds, therefore, have a specific purpose, and cannot come forward to give temporary relief or assistance. The result is that the claims made upon the Helena Benevolent Fund are always very great, as it constantly has to give help in cases where the Annuity or Settlement Funds cannot do so. During the past year it has helped both aged nurses and younger Members who have been overtaken by some unexpected and temporary incapacity. The result is that the "Helena's" bank balance was alarmingly low at the beginning of the year and, although it has greatly recovered owing to the warmhearted generosity of many of our Members, it still requires support, if it is to be of use to our less fortunate fellowmembers in the year now opening. In recognition of the fact that not a single request for help has been refused, during the last twelve months, we ask each Member of the Association to forward the subscription of one shilling annually to the Fund. This is not a very large amount of money, but it means a very large amount of help for sick and aged Members of the Association if each Member rises to the occasion.

ENGAGEMENT.

The engagement of Miss Georgina Neighbour to Major Lawlor, of Westcliffe, is announced. Miss Neighbour is well known to many Members of the Association, and has a seat on its Council. For several years she had a Nursing Home in the West End, which was held in high repute by members of the Medical Profession. We offer to Miss Neighbour and Major Lawlor the good wishes of the Association for their happiness.
