3. The books must not be kept more than a fortnight from the date of issue, and must be brought back to be renewed at the expiration of that period.

4. Books lost or damaged by Fellows and Members must be replaced by them, or the cost of the books refunded.

5. Books of reference cannot be taken away, but can be had on application to the Secretary for use in the College.

6. A book in which members must sign for books on

loan, and dates of issue and return, must be kept in the office.

Miss Graham proposed and Miss Smith seconded the proposition that these Regulations be recommended to the Council.

Lectures and Debates for the New Year.

A letter was read from Miss Amy Phipps asking if the President would give an instruction class in Chairmanship and how to conduct a meeting, and also suggesting different subjects for Debates.

It was proposed from the Chair to ask the President to give these classes. The President stated that she would be pleased to give three classes on "The Conduct of Public Presidents."

Business."

It was proposed by Miss Bushby; and seconded by Miss Graham, that a Course of Elocution Classes should be included in the Curriculum for the New Year. This was agreed and recommended, subject to obtaining cost of lectures, and that each Member of the class should pay an agreed sum towards the expenses.

It was agreed to recommend to the Council that an extra Midwifery Grant should be given if possible, three having already been awarded.

The Meeting then terminated. The Report was adopted.
