THE PASSING BELL.

The risks of road accidents at the present day is emphasised by the deaths of no less than four nurses during the last few weeks.

Miss Mary Finlay, a nurse employed in a Nursing Home at Hampstead, while crossing Haverstock Hill to post a letter, was knocked down by a motor car and killed.

Miss Winifred Cruickshank and Miss Gertrude Bennett of Leicester, School Nurses, employed by the Leicestershire Education Committee were killed in a collision between a two seater motor-car, in which they were travelling, and a motor coach on the Great North Road, between Felton and Morpeth, and Miss Evelyn Morley of Nottingham, who was riding a motor-cycle and crashed into a tram standard and then into a telephone kiosk and was killed.

The members of the Nursing Profession will deplore the loss of these valuable lives and desire to express their

sympathy with the relatives of these nurses.

Miss Mary Bird, R.R.C., who was Matron of the Croydon General Hospital for nearly thirty years and who retired on November 30th, 1923, died at her residence, 51, Temple Road, Croydon, on Monday, June 29th.

Miss Bird performed splendid service for the Hospital, and her many accomplishments during her official duties justified the Board's regret upon her relinquishing her work.

The War Office, recognising Miss Bird's ability and long experience in nursing work and hospital supervision, appointed her Principal Matron of the Home Counties' Division of the Territorial Force Nursing Service, and during the War in her dual position of a Principal Matron under the War Office and Matron of the Croydon General Hospital, she did most important work.

A wide circle of friends in the medical and nursing professions, as well as patients whom she has nursed, will deeply regret to hear of the death, in New York, after an operation of the death of the de operation, of Miss Margaret McClymont Love, S.R.N. Miss Love was trained at the Royal Infirmary, Glasgow, and on the completion of her training joined the staff of the Registered Nurses' Association, now of 39, Portland Place, of which she was a much valued member.
