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and permanently, is most interesting and, in the principles of nursing these patients, we are pleased to see the stress laid on sleep and the dangers of insomnia.

The chapters dealing with mental age and its relation to the Intelligence Quotient are very useful to any teacher in measuring the mental capacity of her pupils and we commend this manual to those interested in mental deficiency persons as a valuable and instructive little book.
