### The Queen a Lady of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

The Court Circular announces that "The King has been pleased, on the occasion of His Majesty's Birthday, to confer upon the Queen the title and dignity of a Lady of the Most Noble Order of the Garter."

Ladies of the Order of the Garter display their banners and affix their heraldic stall-plates in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, in the same way as Knights of the Order.

### WESTMINSTER ABBEY CLOSED.

Our glorious Abbey Church of Westminster is now closed, handed over to the Board of Works in preparation for the Coronation, and will not be reopened until August.

To those of us who live in touch with it the loss is great. No more silent prayers in its dim aisles, no more heartening public worship, no more heart-searching anthems floating away to the foot of The Throne. But the Coronation of a King is of such mighty quality in this our Empire, that only in this national fane is it possible to meet its spiritual demands with due solemnity.

## Coronation Commemoration Pottery.

So keen are collectors to secure the more expensive Coronation commemorative pottery bearing the portrait of King Edward VIII that some firms have sold out their stocks and have resumed manufacture.

Manufacturers are now preparing for the Coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, and it is expected that the new wares will be on sale towards the end of January.

### Coronation Programme.

The prices for the official Coronation programme, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to King George's Jubilee Trust, have been fixed. For the overseas edition the cost will be a flat one of 2s. The home issue will be published in two categories, the standard edition at 1s. and a de luxe edition at 2s. 6d. Already the orders exceed half a million copies.

## Book of Prayer and Meditations.

It is ever a cause for rejoicing when some antique gem is saved from obscurity and placed in safe keeping. Recently the little town of Kendal, in Westmorland, has, through the Mayor, been presented with Queen Katherine Parr's "Book of Prayer and Meditations," a tiny silver-bound book, measuring 2½ inches. As last Consort of Henry the Eighth, Katharine Parr, who was born at Kendal Castle, helped to mould the life of the Princess Elizabeth, read to her this very book, and taught the future great Queen how to govern her people and make her country the greatest in the world.

## Letters of Queen Victoria.

Letters from Queen Victoria to members of the House of Hohenzollern, the first dated 1845 and the last fifty-five years later, are published in the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. They are a few of a large number of Queen Victoria's letters in the Brandenburg-Prussian archives in Berlin, the most important of which are soon, with the permission of the King, to be published in book form.

### Royal Lovers United.

Princess Juliana, heiress to the Crown of the Netherlands, drove in a Golden Coach with Prince Bernhard zur Lippe-Biesterfeld to whom she was united in marriage on January 7th, at the "Great Church" of St. James, at the Hague.

The day was bathed in traditional "Orange" sunshine, and it was a day of great rejoicing for the Dutch people, and the frankly expressed affection of the happy pair was evident to the whole audience. The bridegroom gazed on his bride with adoration, and "a radiance that was almost spiritual seemed to transform Princess Juliana."
Queen Wilhelmina bestowed the title of "Prince of

the Netherlands" on Prince Bernhard, who without doubt was born under a lucky star. His wife is not only a future Queen—but is a great lady who loves him dearly.
