# A REGISTERED NURSE AND THE THRONE.

Mr. C. F. J. Hankinson, editor of *Debrett*, points out that the fourth adult heir to the Throne is Her Royal Highness Princess Arthur of Connaught (Duchess of Fife in her own right) and not the Duke of Connaught, her father-in-law. Princess Arthur of Connaught derives through her mother, the late Princess Royal, the eldest daughter of King Edward VII.

Her Royal Highness is a State Registered Nurse, a professional status of which she is proud, and is President of the Royal British Nurses' Association, the first organisation of Trained Nurses in the world, and which will celebrate its Jubilee in December, 1937.
