The functions of the Committee will be :-(a) To ascertain the nursing personnel available in England and Wales by collecting the numbers of nurses in

the employment of voluntary and statutory organisations and by the compilation and maintenance of a register of all other nurses and nurse assistants who are prepared to offer their services in an emergency; and

(b) To compile and maintain a register of nursing auxiliaries who are prepared to offer their services in an emergency.

NATIONAL OR NAZI?

We have no doubt that members of the nursing profession, a most patriotic group of women, will eagerly offer National Service, and once more, presumably, without avail, we protest against the exclusion of the nurses' independent organisations from representation on a Government Committee dealing with their affairs on which every species of employer is represented.

In refusing representation to Nurses' professional organizations we are informed "that the Minister of

Health cannot see his way, etc.'

We advise the sooner he consults a political oculist the better, as this attempt by a Government Department to suppress free opinion in our ranks has now become an intolerable attempt of coercion. The honourable record of the independent nurses organisations, their creative work, power of organisation and devoted public service is well known, and presumably feared, by the notorious intolerance of many of their employers.

THE REGISTERED NURSES' PARLIAMENTARY COUNCIL.

We learn that so strongly is the recent evidence of coercion felt, that the Registered Nurses' Parliamentary Council, which played such an honourable and successful part in obtaining legal status for nurses, through the Nurses' Registration Acts, intends for the future to take active political action and claim the right of self-determination, as Trades Union organisations have done with signal success, before participating in the coming Appeal for National Service.

The negotiations of the Government with the Trade Unions and the Labour Party regarding the machinery

to be employed have gone very well.

We learn they had some stipulations to make. "They wanted larger industrial representation on the local committees. They wanted a central co-ordinating committee. They wanted to see beforehand the terms of service for whole-time volunteers and the form of the contractual obligations to be undertaken. On the first two points they have received satisfaction. On the others, which are still undetermined, their views will be given full weight. As soon as they are settled, the trade union and political organisations of Labour are prepared to circularise all their local representatives and organisations, urging them to take their full part in the forthcoming effort.

A Lesson for Registered Nurses.

This is a lesson the 85,000 Registered Nurses must take to heart before they will be treated as responsible human beings by the most reactionary Government of modern times, so far as women are concerned.
