THE DEATH OF MISS EMILY JANE HASWELL, S.R.N., F.B.C.N.

It is with the sincerest sorrow that we have to report the fleath of Miss Emily Jane Haswell, whose nursing career during the past 45 years has been a great example to members of the Nursing Profession.

Miss Haswell died on February 6th, and she was laid to rest in the Cemetery at Hawkenbury, Tunbridge Wells, on February 9th, a beautiful sunny morning, before which a beautiful intimate service was held in her house, conducted by the Rev. T. Helm.

Miss E. J. Haswell was trained at the Royal Southern Hospital, Liverpool, and for 30 years was associated with leading nursing organisations especially during the first Great War.

As a member of the Registered Nurses' Society she took an active part in the supervision of the French Flag Nursing Corps which did such wonderful work in the French front line and earned for the nursing staff the compliment from M. Millerand, the French Minister, the expression of opinion that the members of this Corps were the most efficient nurses sent from Great Britain to nurse the French soldiers. Α compliment its London Committee deeply appreciated.

Miss Haswell was an active member of the British College of Nurses, and served on its Council on several occasions, where her help and opinion were considered of the highest value.

Of recent years, during the present War, her health failed, and her passing means a loss of most devoted service

to the Profession of Nursing of which she was for so long an expert example, sincerely beloved by all who were associated with her.
