Meetings of the General Nursing Council for Scotland, were held January 24th, 1947. Miss E. Brodie, M.B.E., was elected Chairman of Council,

Reported that Rules under Section 14 of the Nurses (Scotland) Act, 1943, in regard to remission of training for Registration for certain Enrolled Assistant Nurses were signed on behalf of the Secretary of State for Scotland.

signed on behalf of the Secretary of State for Scotland. Reported that 12 applications from Registered Nurses for Registration with the Council as Sister Tutors, were -considered and approved.

Education, Examination and Registration.

Reported that the names of 13 Nurses who had passed the Council's Examinations and had now attained the age of 21 were submitted and their Registration approved.

Reported 10 applications for re-inclusion in the Register after failures to pay the Retention Fee. All these applications were approved.

Reported that the names of 657 Nurses had been deleted from the Register of Nurses owing to non-payment of the Retention fee.

Reported that four applications for Registration by Reciprocity had been received. Two of these applications were from Nurses already registered in England and Wales, one from a Nurse already registered in British Columbia, Canada, and one from a Nurse already registered in Melbourne, Australia. All these applications were in order and were approved.

BODY MECHANICS IN NURSING ARTS.

This new concept brings renewed vigour and stimulation to Nursing, for the optimal efficiency with which her body functions is of personal concern to each Nurse. Every Nurse who becomes a more critical student of her own body mechanics while working desires for herself benefits from the conservation of her energy and the alleviation of strain and stress, which in turn enables her to provide better care for the patient.
