## THE BRITISH COLLEGE OF NURSES, LTD.

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The Council of the British College of Nurses, Ltd., having carefully considered the Report of the Working Party on the Recruitment and Training of Nurses, came to the following conclusions, which were forwarded to the Minister of Health and to the National Council of Nurses of Great Britain and Northern Ireland :

(a) That the Basic Training of two years is insufficient to qualify candidates to become Registered Nurses and they consider that training should be of at least three years' duration including special branches of nursing.

(b) That the comprehensive training and co-operation of study could be managed by a committee of the Matrons and the Sister Tutors concerned, as the Council of the British College of Nuises, Ltd. considers that to remove the training from the direct supervision of the Matron's department would be detrimental to the Nuising Profession.

(c) The Council strongly deprecates any recommendation that would in any way diminish the responsibility and powers of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales.
