The Dr. Bedford Fenwick Memorial.

Under this Memorial Scheme the Council has decided to make arrangements for a scholar to attend the next International Council Congress.

Benevolent Grants.

A sum of £417 has been distributed in grants to members of the College from the Ethel Mary Fletcher Benevolent Fund. These grants have been made to old members whose incomes have seriously depreciated owing to the increased high cost of living, and ill-health. Thirteen members are now receiving a grant of 10s. weekly from the fund.

"The British Journal of Nursing."

International Council of Nurses.

The Passing Bell.

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We report with deep sorrow the passing of Sister Faith Daniels, very suddenly on January 26th. She was a revered fellow of this College for many years; meeting her left one with an unfading memory of a lovable, generous personality whose life was spent in devotion to others.

The Mother Superior of the community in which Sister Faith served writes :----

Sister Faith was an S.R.N. trained at King's College Hospital, London, 1920-23, and after nursing at Hampstead General Hospital and at the Victoria Hospital, Tite Street, Chelsea, was in charge of a surgical ward at the Children's Hospital, Great Ormond Street, London, 1925-29.

In 1929 Sister Faith came to test her vocation in the Community of the Holy Family, Baldslow, St. Leonards, an Educational Community of the Church of England and was professed in 1934.

During the war when the Community's boarding school was evacuated to Gloucestershire, Sister Faith remained at the Mother House and was in charge of the Baldslow First Aid and Home Guard casualty clearing post, to which part of the Community Buildings was given over.

of the Community Buildings was given over. Besides her nursing work, Sister Faith did a good deal of Church needlework; a set of vestments made by her was used for the first time the Sunday before she died.

Sister Faith will be much missed, not only by the Community, but also by many village friends, to whom she was always ready to render first aid in minor emergencies.

She was laid to rest on January 29th in the Community's burial ground, a beautiful and peaceful spot.
