The Mothercraft Exhibition will be open daily, except Sunday, from 2.0 to 10.0 p.m. and admission will be only 1s.

Other great competitions taking place during Scotland's Mothercraft Week will be a Baby Snapshot Competition, which will be judged by Glasgow's famous child photographer Mr. Norton Pratt. The first prize will be a portrait photograph of the winning baby to the value of ten guineas (£10 10s.).

The Handicrafts Competition also looks like being one of the highlights of this unique exhibition. There is no entry

fee, but only one piece of work may be entered by each competitor in any of the following sections:—

Needlework, Embroidery, Leatherwork, Soft Toys, Jewellery Making, Lampshade Making, Crotchet Work, Pottery, Artificial Flowers, Basketry, Weaving, Knitting and Quilting.

First prize is £10, with bronze plaques and certificates of

merit for the runners-up.

Judging will take place at the Exhibition and the winning entries will be displayed in a prominent position in glass

There will be a pram park for mothers and fathers who wish to bring their off-spring and in the Commercial Section many new articles for the Nursery and Mother's Workroom will be on show.

Scotland's famous Hepburn Prams, Mr. Norton Pratt's wonderful child photographs, baby soap and powder, cereals, rusks, patent baby foods, a new delicious type of orange juice for babies, knitting machines for making baby clothes in the home and many other interesting exhibits will be displayed in that section.

Scotland's first Mothercraft Exhibition is not sponsored by any Scottish or English newspaper, woman's journal or publishing company, but an independent, non-subsidised

private enterprise.

Gynaecology for Senior Students of Nursing.*

New Zealand has produced some of the best authorities in the world, on this and kindred subjects; and this publication is no exception.

It is primarily written for the more advanced student. who will find the subject intelligible without the assistance of an instructor.

The early chapters, serve the basis for later discussions. It presents a survey of modern gynaecology, with explana-

tion to the type of reader for whom it is intended.
