A COTTAGE HOSPITAL FOR BARNET.

ON Saturday last the Earl of Strafford laid the foundation-stone of a new cottage hospital at Barnet. The hospital, which will cost about $\pounds 3,000$, and will accommodate ten patients, is intended to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee, and, by command of Her Majesty, will be known as the Victoria Hospital for Barnet and District. It is the intention of the committee to add, at some future date, a dispensary and a home for trained nurses who will undertake the nursing of the sick poor in the district. Addresses were delivered by the Earl of Strafford, Sir Charles Nicholson, Rev. H. Joy Browne, Rev. D. W. Barrett, Frank Bevan, Esq., and Rev. G. Twentyman, hon. sec.

HOSPITAL INTELLIGENCE. COMMUNICATED AND COLLECTED.

THE Small-pox Hospital of the St. George's Local Board, Bristol, is completed.

MR. BANBURY, of 60, Eaton Place, S.W., has just given \pounds 500 to the Hospital at St. Leonards-on-Sea.

THE Earl of Derby, Mr. O. Heywood, Mr. Jardine, Mr. Crossley, and Sir W. Houldsworth have each contributed $\pounds_{1,000}$ to the St. Mary's Hospital for Women at Manchester.

ROSTREVOR, in Ulster, is about to have a sanatorium provided for it.

MR. NATHANIEL MONTEFIÖRE has given \pounds 1,500 to the University College Hospital, and some Colonial "Old Students" have made donations. The patients relieved in 1887 were 44,380, and the debt owing last year is \pounds 17,000.
