HOSPITAL INTELLIGENCE.

REPORTS OF INSTITUTIONS, ETC., COMMUNICATED AND COLLECTED.

THE COTTAGE AND CONVALESCENT HOMES, REIGATE.—The reports of these interesting Institutions are before us. Both are evidently doing good and much-needed work under the fostering care of Mrs. Kitto, of St. Martin's Vicarage, Charing Cross. During the sixteen years that the Convalescent Home has been in existence, 3,616 persons have participated in the benefits of the charity, 318 of this number having been admitted in the past year. The Cottage Home for Little Girls has been established four years, and receives eight female children between the ages of eight and fifteen. Such institutions as these are eminently worthy of support.

THE SANITARY INSTITUTE.—The first meeting of the Council of this society, which has recently been incorporated, was held at the Parkes Museum on Friday. The Institute is founded to carry on the objects of the Amalgamated Sanitary Institute of Great Britain and the Parkes Museum. Sir Douglas Galton, K.C.B., F.R.S., was unanimously appointed Chairman of the Council, and Mr. G. J. Symons, F.R.S., the Registrar. H.R.H. the Duchess of Albany and H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge have graciously consented to become members of the Institute. The Marquis of Ripon, Earl Derby, Earl Bathurst, Viscount Cranbrook, the Bishop of London, Lord Ebury, Lord Mount-Temple, and 370 other members and associates were enrolled. important letter was read from the Charity Commissioners, saying that they considered that the new Institute was likely to prove a powerful means for the diffusion of sanitary knowledge, and promising to grant facilities to the Institute to deliver lectures in the various buildings which the Commissioners proposed to establish in various parts of London. It was decided to hold the Institute's first Examination for Local Surveyors and Inspectors of Nuisances on November 8th and 9th. A programme of lectures for the winter session is in course of preparation.
