Editorial.

ANOTHER LONDON HOSPITAL SCANDAL.

OME weeks ago, our readers may remember that we called attention to the flagrant injustice with which a Nurse had been treated by the Lon-

don Hospital Committee; at the same time publishing a forcible letter from her on the details of her case. A fortnight ago, we published a further letter from Miss FISHER, and, on the same date, a verbatim report of the recent Meeting of the Governors of the London Hospital at which the matter was discussed. We have, to our great regret, been compelled, by our duty to the profession we represent, to complain frequently, during the past three years, of scandals in connection with the Nursing Department of this great Hospital, and especially with regard to the attitude assumed by the Committee when complaints have been brought before them. These gentlemen seem quite oblivious of the fact that they only hold their position by the will of the Governors, and that the Hospital is not a private concern of their own to be mismanaged as they please. They have openly expressed their resentment at the charges brought against the Nursing Department. If they had stopped there, we should not have minded so much; but they publicly
