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THE REGISTRATION OF NURSES .--- VII.

N the same day that this protest against registration appeared in the Press, a great meeting was held at the Mansion House in favour of the

scheme. It was addressed by such eminent medical men as Mr. (now Sir WILLIAM) SAVORY, Professor MARSHALL (then President of the General Medical Council), Sir HENRY ACLAND, Sir JAMES CRICHTON-BROWNE, Mr. BRUDENELL CARTER, Dr. MATTHEWS DUN-CAN, and others. It would be invidious to quote what one more than another of these celebrated gentlemen said in favour of Registration, although it has since been freely acknowledged that the trenchant criticism to which Sir JAMES CRICHTON-BROWNE subjected the arguments urged against it, was a model of argumentative power. But some of the remarks made by the President of the General Medical Council-the body entrusted by Parliament with the supervision of medical education and registration in the United Kingdom-are so important in view of the suggestion which has frequently been made since that the work of registering Nurses should be undertaken by that body, that it will be well to reproduce them here. Professor MAR-SHALL said :- "There is certainly a point of

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
