T is an extraordinary fact that neither the Superior of the Sisterhood of St. John the Divine, nor anyone connected with the Institution, have made the slightest reply to the inquiries made by two correspondents in the Times, asking for explicit information concerning the training of the Nurse implicated in the Bengeo College tragedy.
