

EAST TO WEST.

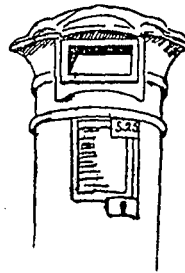
Sunset smiles on sunrise: east and west are one,
