### WHAT IT IS.

The Nurses' Fellowship is a Department of the Mothers' Union, for Nurses who are interested in the objects and work of this world-wide Society, with over 600,000 members of every race and colour. The aim of the Nurses' Fellowship is to give spiritual help to Nurses in their own lives and in their work.

The Fellowship is especially helpful for District Nurses and Midwives whose work takes them into the homes of their patients. The Fellowship links up the needs of

#### Who Can Join

Membership is open to hospital trained Nurses, whether working in hospital, privately, or on the district, Midwives, Health Visitors, School Nurses and Assistant and Student Nurses so that with their special opportunities of service they may become fellow-workers in the Mothers' Union.

The Fellowship is open to retired as well as practising Nurses, whether married or single.

Who hold Marriage to be indissoluble.

Who desire to uphold the Sanctity of Marriage and Parenthood, and to maintain a high standard in home and national life by Prayer and Personal Example.

#### How IT WORKS

The Nurses' Fellowship works in a diocese through the Nurses' Fellowship Representative. Nurse Members are usually attached to a Mothers' Union branch in order that they may be able to keep in touch with Mothers' Union work.

Owing to their different duties it is realised that Nurse Members will not always be able to attend the branch meetings regularly, and the Enrolling Member will keep the Nurse informed of branch and diocesan activities. Those who are unable to be branch members will be in touch with the Diocesan Representative direct.
