The lamp (which was used in the film "The Lady with a Lamp '') was presented to him by one of the youngest nurses on the staff.

Three other Mayors watched the ceremony-the Mayors of Westminster, Finsbury and St. Pancras.

Formerly a bomb-damaged hotel, the home has been partly renovated at a cost of over £20,000. Now a further £10,000 is required to clear the debt and to complete an unfinished portion comprising ten urgently needed extra bedrooms.

The So far, 26 bedrooms have been made habitable. bright and airy home also contains a midwives' room, district nursing room, nurses' sitting room and lecture room.

### Care of the Medical Patient.\*

A Textbook for Nurses by Margene O. Faddis, R.N., M.A., Joseph M. Hayman, Jr., B.A., M.D.

THIS VERY EXCELLENT TEXTBOOK has been written primarily for Student Nurses " to help nurses more fully to appreciate their privileges and better to assume their responsibilities in the care of the medical patient."

As a post-graduate Nurse responsible for teaching students I have found this book to be an absolute treasure. Never before have I so enjoyed reading a textbook; never before have I read such lucid, concentrated and infallible accounts of the various medical diseases and conditions.

The chapters on Cardiovascular Diseases and Infectious Diseases are first-class. Each disease and condition is described in cameo relief; clear cut, authentic, brief, yet complete, and withal most interestingly presented. So also are the chapters on the Ductless Gland disturbances, and Diseases of the Nervous System.

Short of my praise of this book being fulsome, I cannot praise it sufficiently. Every chapter leaves witness to the intellect, learning and specialised knowledge of its two brilliant authors-an American Nurse and American Doctor, and their infinite capacity for taking pains and checking the smallest detail. The book is a *vade-mecum* for the ambitious medical nurse, and it should be an outstanding success and find its way into all our English Nurse Training Schools. G. M. H.
