## As Others See Us.

FROM NEW ZEALAND a member of the British College of Nurses, Ltd., writes on March 22nd, 1952, hoping that her colleagues in England enjoyed a good Christmas.

"It still seems strange to have Christmas at mid-summer, to me it is shorn of much of its solemnity and gaiety in much the same way that Easter does, by falling in Autumn instead of Spring. Life is certainly much easier here than in England, but I still say 'give me England with all its woes.'

"We all had a very great shock when we heard of the death of the King! We had followed so closely all the news of the King's progress. I listened in to the broadcast of

the funeral, it began shortly after 9 p.m. until 2.30 a.m. We could hear the bells, the horses hoofs, the words of command to the troops, marching feet and the bands as they passed! All very poignant.

"I am so thankful that Mr. Churchill was at the head of affairs for the funeral and the commencement of the new Reign and sincerely hope that the Queen will have a long and successful reign.

"Things still sound very grim in England."

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
