Higher Birth Rate.

THE REGISTRAR GENERAL announces that provisional figures for England and Wales for the third quarter of this year show that the birth rate was higher and the stillbirth and infant mortality rates lower than the rates for the corresponding quarter of 1952.

Live Births.

Live births registered numbered 172,976, representing a rate of 15.6 per thousand population; in the third quarters of 1952 and 1951, the corresponding figures were 168,030 and 168,033 respectively, the rate being 15.2 in respect of each

Stillbirths.

There were 3,709 stillbirths registered, representing a rate of 21.0 per thousand total live and stillbirths, compared with 3,714 and a rate of 21.6 in the corresponding quarter of 1952. The figures for the third quarter of 1938 were 6,072 and 37.0 respectively.
