"This is the only Obstetric Training School in South Australia for Medical Students from Adelaide University, as well as a training school for Nurses. The medical students come into residence for two or three weeks at a time during their fourth, fifth and sixth years.

"My small part here is with the Trainee Nurses, giving them lectures in Midwifery and Infant Care. There are from 70-75 trainees at a time in various stages of training.

"The examinations are held in April, August and November and from 20-30 nurses sit for them each time from the Queen Victoria Maternity Hospital. There are first the hospital and then the Nurses Board exams., the theory of the latter is held at Adelaide University and the viva voce at this hospital.

"Of the six states in the Commonwealth, South Australia is the only one where the period of training is still nine months for general certificated Nurses. With a working week of 40 hours it is becoming necessary to lengthen the training. Our Nurses Board has not as yet conformed to this ruling, because they feel the extra three months should consist of post-graduate work, with good theoretical and practical instruction in anaesthesia and relaxation.

"Occasionally, we accept girls who have had no previous nursing experience and they do an 18 month's course to gain their Midwifery and Infant Care certificate. This means, of course, that they have to pass an exam. in Anatomy and Physiology, invalid cookery and general outline of nursing before they can sit for their final examinations. Most of these girls want this shorter training, before leaving as missionaries.

"Many of our nurses come from interstate to do their training here, whilst many of the South Australian general trained nurses go to the Obstetric training schools of other States. So it is always most interesting discussing the merits of our various training schools throughout the Commonwealth."

Q.A.R.A.N.C. Celebrations.

THE CELEBRATION OF CORPS DAY by the Queen Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps which had to be postponed from March 27th owing to the death of Queen Mary will now take place on Monday, April 13th.

(The Q.A.I.M.N.S., predecessor of the Q.A.R.A.N.C., was formed on March 27th, 1902. The history of the Army Nursing Service goes back further still, for Florence Nightingale formed the first nucleus of a recognised military nursing service in the Crimean War.)

The Depot of the Q.A.R.A.N.C. was established at Hindhead, Surrey, on May 1st, 1950, and was officially opened by the then Adjutant-General, General Sir James Steele, K.C.B., K.B.E., D.S.O., M.C., LL.D., on September 13th, 1950.

Corps Day will be celebrated at the Depot by a ceremonial parade, at 2.30 p.m. The inspecting officer will be Dame Louisa Wilkinson, D.B.E., R.R.C., Colonel Commandant Q.A.R.A.N.C. and late Matron-in-Chief of the Q.A.I.M.N.S. She will be accompanied by the Matron-in-Chief and Director of Army Nursing Services, Brigadier H. S. Gillespie, M.B.E., R.R.C., Q.H.N.S. The parade will be commanded by the Commandant of the Depot and T.E., Q.A.R.A.N.C., Colonel N. P. de B. Bampton, R.R.C.

There will be approximately 40 officers and 200 other ranks on parade. Although March 27th was the official Corps Day of the Q.A.R.A.N.C., Corps week will be celebrated from June 6th-13th, 1953. The Q.A.R.A.N.C. Association Reunion will be held on Saturday, June 6th, 1953, and a drum-head service and parade will take place on Sunday, June 7th.
