When all were in their places, the National Anthem was sung and then—The Dean addressed the people.

WE are met together to render thanks to God Almighty that He in His infinite compassion, has led man af W that He, in His infinite compassion, has led men of good intent from times immemorial to provide shelter, help and maintenance for those who suffer from want, sickness and infirmity. The hazards of life and the burdens of old age have been relieved by the beneficence of those who, from the days of King Athelstan to the time of our present gracious Sovereign, have obeyed the divine behest to love their neighbours as themselves...

We are here to recall how great was the service to soul and body rendered by the early hospitals in periods of

social disquiet and uncertainty. The devoted brothers and sisters who served in them command our grateful remembrance. They have handed down to us a tradition of unselfish devotion to duty which is nobly maintained by their successors today.

We are here also to give thanks for those who have planted in every corner of the realm Harbours of Refuge from the misfortunes and accidents of life, Houses of Rest for the evening of men's days. The founders, inspired by God to efforts towards the public weal, have expended freely of their substance. The builders fashioned the sheltered courts and pleasant groups of dwellings with a pious zeal. And through good and evil days, those upon whom these trusts have fallen, to administer and maintain them, have worked single-mindedly to carry out the true intent of their founders' beneficence. And today, when the stress of life, its anxieties and uncertainties, are more than ever with us, we are here to ask a blessing on those who are resolved to keep alive a noble tradition and to see that in this great sphere of service the present generation shall not fail.

This was followed by the Hymn, "All People that on Earth do Dwell."

The collection, on behalf of the National Association of Almshouses, was taken during the singing of "Now thank we all our God."


Then came the concluding Prayer by the Dean:-
