Prize Essay Competitions for 1954 Study Tour in Europe

The titles of the open prize essay competitions for 1954 are announced by the Royal Sanitary Institute. Two prizes are offered this year as follows:—

The John Edward Worth Prize of £70 for an essay on "The Advantages and Disadvantages in the Use of Alternative Materials as Substitutes for Traditional Materials in Building Construction, Sanitary Appliances and Fittings." The prize of £70 for this competition is to be used for a study of domestic sanitary science in Europe.

The John S. Owens Prize of £21 (twenty guineas) for an essay on "Modern Practices in the Conservation of Heat, with Special Reference to Smokeless Fuel Appliances."

Intending competitors should apply to the Secretary, the Royal Sanitary Institute, 90, Buckingham Palace Road, London, S.W.1, for a copy of the conditions. Entries must be received by December 31st, 1954.

Book Exhibition

A publishers' exhibition of scientific and technical books relating to public health and allied subjects will be one of the new features at this year's Health Congress of the Royal Sanitary Institute which is to take place at Scarborough from April 27th to 30th. Delegates and visitors numbering about 2,300 are expected from many parts of the world.

The Passing Bell.

Miss Anna Schwarzenberg

WE MUCH REGRET to learn through the January, 1954, News Letter of the International Council of Nurses, of the death, early in the month in Austria, of Miss Anna Schwarzenberg, the Executive Secretary of the International Council of Nurses from 1935-1947.

The Princess Anna Schwarzenberg (who preferred to be addressed as "Miss") was a graduate of the Rudolphinerhaus, Vienna, and during the session 1926-27 followed the Course of Nurse Administrators and Teachers in Schools of Nursing at Bedford College (University of London).

She supplemented this training by a year of study in the United States, where she took a Course in Hospital

and Training School Administration at Teachers' College, Columbia University.

After returning to Austria she held a post as Instructress at a School of Nursing at Gratz.

A dynamic personality, Miss Schwarzenberg had also had unusual opportunities culturally and socially, speaking several languages, which much contributed to her success in the position she held in the International Council of Nurses.

We will remember her for her charming personality and forthright individuality which never failed her despite the sufferings she and her illustrious family endured through the devastations of the Great War.

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
